METHODOLOGY

Welcome to the 2023 **OPPORTUNITY SCORECARD!**

During the recent legislative session, Opportunity Arkansas identified good and bad policy that was working its way through the Arkansas General Assembly, in relation to how it impacted opportunity for all Arkansans. We worked diligently to provide analysis about the effects of proposed legislative changes and informed the public and lawmakers through policy pieces, research, polling, email newsletters, and our public-facing bill tracker, where we graded bills on a scale from A to F.

In many ways, this report is a culmination of that work.

In this scorecard, we score 19 pieces of legislation, all of which have a direct impact on either expanding or reducing opportunity for Arkansans. Lawmakers' votes were tallied and rated based on how they voted in relation to Opportunity Arkansas's policy positions.



Our 2023 Opportunity Scorecard was created to educate the public about the voting records of their representatives and to recognize the hard work and conservative dedication of policymakers who have fought to expand opportunity in the Land of Opportunity.

As identified in our **Roadmap to Opportunity 2023**, Opportunity Arkansas is focused on creating generational solutions in six key policy pathways:


- 1. Making the Arkansas workforce competitive;

- 3. Restoring law and order;
- 4. Putting Arkansas families first;
- 5. Rebuilding the safety net; and
- 6. Reducing the state bureaucracy



OPPORTUNITY PIONEERS

These legislators are recognized for their leadership and hard work on specific issues that align with Opportunity Arkansas's policy goals. Without their leadership, many of these transformational policy victories would not have been possible.



SENATOR BREANNE DAVIS

Sen. Davis was a lead sponsor of the LEARNS Act (SB294) which brought universal educational freedom to all Arkansans. She went toe-to-toe with protectors of the status quo in the Senate Education Committee, on the Senate floor, and in

the media. Thanks in part to her hard work and dedication, all Arkansas kids will be better prepared for the workforce, our classrooms will be free from indoctrination, and parents will have a say in their children's education.



SENATOR BEN GILMORE

Sen. Gilmore was the visionary and driving force behind much of the Protect Arkansas Act (SB495). Passed overwhelmingly, this act will bring long-overdue parole and sentencing reform to Arkansas. It also seeks to ease reentry for non-violent

offenders leaving prison and accelerate their entry back into the workforce. Finally, the Protect Arkansas Act provides new resources and protections for victims and their families. Arkansas has been plagued with a violent crime crisis for too long, and the state has been avoiding uncomfortable conversations and tough decisions about this issue for the better part of a decade. But thanks to Sen. Gilmore's leadership, Arkansas is now on a path to lower crime and safer communities, which means more opportunity for all.



SENATOR CLINT PENZO

Sen. Penzo was the lead Senate sponsor of several pro-work. pro-opportunity bills this session, including cash welfare reform and unemployment reform. His preparation and hard work on the Senate side of the capitol made these important

victories possible. Because of his efforts, our safety net is stronger and work is within closer reach for more Arkansans.

REP. KEITH BROOKS

Rep. Brooks was a key driver in Arkansas's push for educational freedom. This work began not in January, but years ago. Indeed, Rep. Brooks' focus and determination to empower parents and ensure all Arkansas kids have access to a quality

education cannot be understated. He studied and researched the issues, talked to stakeholders around the state, sought input from peers in other states, and worked diligently to help craft a comprehensive education reform package that puts parents in charge and students first. Thanks to his work, the next generation has greater access to opportunity and prosperity.



REP. REBECCA BURKES

As a first-term legislator, Rep. Burkes wasted absolutely no time getting right to work for the people of Arkansas. She led on numerous issues, from welfare reform (HB1401) to unemployment reform to reducing barriers to work. She has been

named an Opportunity Pioneer for her leadership on all of these issues. Also, because of her stellar voting record (96%), she is one of just two legislators to receive two OAF awards this year.



REP. DAVID RAY

Rep. Ray was the driving force behind special election reform, A&P tax reform, and prohibiting local income taxes. Many of these reforms have been attempted in the past, but have fallen short. Thanks to his persistence, preparation, and ability to

build partnerships, Rep. Ray got them done. These efforts will protect Arkansas taxpayers from sneaky tax hikes hidden in special elections, stop cities and counties from hiking taxes without voter input, and stop local governments from taxing work.

STRONG LEADERSHIP AWARD Winner



REP. ROBIN LUNDSTRUM

Rep. Lundstrum is the inaugural winner of the Strong Leadership Award. Not only did she play a key role in reforming Arkansas's

unemployment system (HB1430), but she also worked diligently behind the scenes with freshman members to prepare their bills and gain their footing in the legislaturegoing above and beyond her baseline responsibilities and instead choosing to invest extra time in her new colleagues. Her direct and indirect partnership played a significant role in many of the successful policy victories highlighted in this scorecard. For these reasons and more, we are proud to honor her with the 2023 Strong Leadership Award.

About the STRONG **LEADERSHIP AWARD**

The Strong Leadership Award is named for William A. Strong, Sr., an Arkansas pioneer and a patriot.

Over the course of his career, Mr. Strong owned 13 companies, with manufacturing plants in Arkansas, Illinois, South Carolina, and Texas. He created new products, owning 10 patents, including creating new applications for vermiculite and creating machines to apply new



products he created. He developed a system for rehabilitating manholes and sanitary sewers in a way that revolutionized the industry.

Beyond his entrepreneurial spirit, he had a great love for America and the American dream. He supported internships for young conservatives at the Heritage Foundation, the Leadership Institute, and Young America's Foundation. He fought for free-market principles and was an incredible philanthropist, both in Arkansas and across the country. Never retiring, Mr. Strong worked right up until he passed away in 2013.

Mr. Strong's values are the same values OAF seeks to recognize with this award innovation, leadership, and hard work.

This award is for those legislators who truly go above and beyond to help expand opportunity in Arkansas; those who aren't confined by the way things have always been done but are always looking for a better way to do things. They are legislators who break the mold because they know Arkansas needs new, homegrown ideas for real change.

Mr. Strong's legacy is a part Opportunity Arkansas's story and we are honored to keep his legacy alive for years to come through the Strong Leadership Award.

SB306:

EXPANDING FOOD STAMPS TO INDIVIDUALS WITH SIGNIFICANT ASSETS

LEAD SPONSORS: Sen. Dismang & Rep. Vaught

The original version of SB306 would have expanded food stamps to individuals with up to \$12,500 in cash assets in the bank. The House version that ultimately became law, if approved by the federal government, will still expand food stamps by allowing households to temporarily exceed the food stamp asset limit without being disenrolled.

PRO-OPPORTUNITY POSITION: No

HB1027:

REQUIRING VOTER INPUT ON LOCAL ASP FOOD AND **LODGING TAXES**

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Ray & Sen. M. Johnson

This legislation will ensure that local voters have a say before being subjected to advertising and promotion (A&P) taxes. Previously, A&P taxes—which can be as high as 3 percent—were the only local tax in the state of Arkansas that could be imposed without direct consent of the voters. This has contributed to ever-increasing local tax burdens on Arkansans.

SB90:

ADOPTING UNIVERSAL LICENSING RECOGNITION

LEAD SPONSORS: Sen. Hill & Rep. McCollum

This bill creates a smooth pathway for workers from other states to transfer their occupational licenses and work experience to Arkansas. This is a significant boost to Arkansas's overall workforce competitiveness and will greatly decrease the difficulty of recruiting licensed workers to the Natural State.

HB1185:

EXPANDING PUBLIC SCHOOL CHOICE

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Mayberry & Sen. Clark

This bill expanded public school choice by allowing more students to attend a school in another district without exceeding the annual interdistrict cap on transfers. While the LEARNS Act now supersedes this legislation (see below), this was an important bill for ensuring that the next generation has the best opportunity to succeed.

HB1401:

REDUCING THE CASH WELFARE TIME LIMIT

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Burkes & Sen. Penzo

This legislation reduces the cash welfare time limit from 24 months to 12 months (the federally-required minimum) for households with work-eligible adults, encouraging them to reenter the workforce. This ties Arkansas with only one other state (Arizona) for the lowest cash welfare time limit in the country.

PRO-OPPORTUNITY POSITION: UES

HB1430:

REFORMING AR UNEMPLOYMENT SYSTEM

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Lundstrum & Sen. Hammer

This bill makes numerous changes to Arkansas's unemployment insurance provisions-including reducing the maximum duration of unemployment benefits and lowering unemployment taxes on businesses—to grow Arkansas's workforce. With a new maximum time limit of 12 weeks, Arkansas now has the shortest unemployment benefits length in the nation.

SB294:

UNLEASHING UNIVERSAL EDUCATION FREEDOM (THE LEARNS ACT)

LEAD SPONSORS: Sen. Davis & Rep. Brooks

The LEARNS Act dramatically expands educational freedom in Arkansas through education freedom accounts (EFAs), while also making other improvements to Arkansas's education system via investments in teacher salaries, reforms to school safety, and more. It is without a doubt one of the broadest, boldest, most comprehensive education reforms in United States history.

SB473:

BANNING AUTOMATIC TEACHER UNION DUES

LEAD SPONSORS: Sen. Bryant & Rep. Hodges

This legislation prevents the deduction of union fees from Arkansas's public school employees' salaries. Now, teachers interested in contributing will have to contribute directly, protecting them from a cut out of their paycheck.

HB1510:

CURBING SPECIAL ELECTION ABUSE

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Ray & Sen. Payton

This legislation limits towns and counties from scheduling special elections during low-turnout times, ensuring more Arkansans have a voice on important issues like local tax hikes. Cities and counties have notoriously hid these issues at poorly-advertised special elections, resulting in higher taxes on Arkansans.

HB1575:

INCREASING UNEMPLOYMENT WORK SEARCH REQUIREMENTS

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Burkes & Sen. Penzo

This bill requires that unemployment recipients conduct at least five job search activities per week in order to maintain eligibility for benefits, helping them to reenter the workforce more quickly. Previously, they were required to conduct only three work searches per week.

HB1026:

PROHIBITING LOCAL INCOME TAXES

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Ray & Sen. Payton

This bill will prohibit Arkansas cities and counties from imposing a local-level income tax on their citizens, preempting the ability of overzealous localities to claw away earnings from hardworking Arkansans.

PRO-OPPORTUNITY POSITION: VES

SB495:

RESTORING PEACE TO OUR COMMUNITIES (THE PROTECT ARKANSAS ACT)

LEAD SPONSORS: Sen. Gilmore & Rep. Gazaway

This legislation makes numerous changes to Arkansas's criminal justice system—including by reforming the parole process, strengthening minimum sentencing times, improving victim notification requirements, reevaluating corrections training programs, and more—in order to hold violent criminals accountable and put victims first.

HB1196:

REQUIRING WORK FOR ABLE-BODIED HOUSING RECIPIENTS

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Underwood & Sen. Gilmore

This bill requires able-bodied adults in Arkansas's public housing programs to participate in work activities or volunteer at least part-time, helping reduce welfare dependency. This legislation is contingent upon a federal waiver.

PRO-OPPORTUNITY POSITION: UES

SB549:

REDUCING PERSONAL AND CORPORATE INCOME TAXES

LEAD SPONSORS: Sen. Dismang & Rep. Eaves

This bill cuts Arkansas's top marginal personal income tax rate from 4.9% to 4.7%, and reduces Arkansas's corporate income tax rate from 5.3% to 5.1%, providing \$124 million in tax relief. While we felt the legislature could have been far more aggressive with tax cuts this session, this is still a step in the right direction towards eliminating the state income tax altogether.

PRO-OPPORTUNITY POSITION: UES

HB1340:

EXPANDING FOOD STAMPS FOR CERTAIN VETERANS

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Tosh & Sen. Wallace

This legislation requires the Department of Human Services to seek a waiver to exclude veterans' disability income from counting for purposes of eligibility for food stamps. If approved, it will expand welfare to individuals who did not previously qualify. Even worse, the legislation included no fiscal note, so taxpayers have no indication of how much additional money it will cost.

HB1592:

EXPANDING THE 'HOLLYWOOD HANDOUT'

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. C. Fite & Sen. Dismana

This bill expands an existing special interest welfare giveaway in the form of an enhanced tax credit to the film industry financed by Arkansas taxpayers.

Not only does the legislation redirect funds to special interests that do not share Arkansas's values, it also pushes the prospect of income tax repeal further into the future by effectively spending money.

SB477:

EXPANDING FREE LUNCHES WELFARE EXPANSION

LEAD SPONSORS: Sen. Dismang & Rep. Vaught

This legislation unnecessarily qualifies all families who currently receive reduced-price school meals for free school meals, even if the family's income is well above the federal poverty level. Previously, households from 130% to 185% of the federal poverty level qualified for reduced-price lunches. In real dollars, 185% FPL is \$55,500 per year for a family of four, or more than the median Arkansas household income. They paid less than 50 cents per school meal. Now, these costs will be borne by taxpayers.

HB1681:

PROHIBITING GUARANTEED INCOME PROGRAMS

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Andrews & Sen. Bryant

This bill prohibits any state or local entity from enacting a welfare-like guaranteed income program, preempting bureaucrats or liberal localities from increasing dependency on government at the taxpayer's expense.

HB1004:

ENHANCING SEX OFFENDER DISCLOSURE REQUIREMENTS

LEAD SPONSORS: Rep. Ray & Sen. M. Johnson

This legislation enhances public information with respect to sex offender registration and disclosure requirements. It will enhance public safety by increasing public awareness of sex offenders' presence in local communities.

METHODOLOGY

HOW WE CHOSE BILLS TO SCORE

The 2023 Opportunity Scorecard was compiled based on 19 key votes from the Arkansas 2023 regular legislative session.

Legislators were graded based on how they voted on critical pieces of legislation related to issues impacting opportunity for Arkansans. All scored bills fall within one of Opportunity Arkansas's policy pathways.

The majority of the bills listed on the scorecard achieve reforms that Opportunity Arkansas has directly promoted through research, testimony, direct legislative engagement, emails, opinion pieces, polling, and more. Additionally, every scored bill was graded and included on Opportunity Arkansas's online bill tracker during the legislative session.

HOW WE WEIGHTED BILLS

Bills were weighted using a point system based on their relative policy significance. Bills in the highest tier of importance could provide a legislator 3 points for voting the right way; bills in the middle tier could convey 2 points; and bills in the lowest tier were worth 1 point. In general, bills that closely reflected the priorities and reforms contained in our "2023 Roadway to Opportunity" were worth more points.

HOW WE COMPUTED SCORES AND HANDLED ABSENCES

Legislators who voted "yes" on a good bill or "no" on a bad bill earned the maximum number of points associated with that bill's tier. In contrast, legislators who voted "no" on a good bill or "yes" on a bad bill earned zero points.

Legislators who voted "present" or refused to vote on a bad bill earned the maximum number of points associated with that bill's tier. Similarly, legislators who voted "present" or refused to vote on a good bill earned zero points.

Finally, legislators who received an excused absence (as indicated on the legislative web roll call) for a bill did not have that particular vote included in their score so as not to unfairly penalize them. Only the Senate utilizes excused absences.

In all cases, the roll call votes that were scored represent the most recent roll call vote on the bill. In almost all instances, the legislative scores reflect bills that were identical between both chambers when they were voted on by the House and Senate. The key exception is SB306, in which the Senate vote included in the scorecard represents the initial version of the bill that Opportunity Arkansas vigorously engaged on, whereas the House vote included in the scorecard represents a highly watered-down version that does not increase food stamp enrollment.

HOW WE SELECTED AWARD WINNERS

Opportunity Arkansas has two categories of award winners.

The first category, known as **Opportunity Defenders**, are those who scored at or above 90% overall on the OAF scorecard. These legislators consistently voted in the direction of opportunity and growth throughout the entirety of the legislative session. Less than 15% of all legislators achieved this distinction, truly underscoring the significance of this score.

The second category are **Opportunity Pioneers**. These are legislators who not just voted the right way but are leaders who picked up the baton and charged the hill towards more opportunity for all Arkansans. They were selected based on particular reforms they sponsored and championed that align with Opportunity Arkansas's core issue areas. We felt strongly that these leaders deserved special recognition. Indeed, many legislators benefited directly from these Pioneers' work; without their efforts, many pieces of legislation that boosted the scores of legislators would have never existed had it not been for these Pioneers. They achieved some of the most meaningful reforms this session-and, in some cases, in Arkansas history.
